

Our primary concern is the safety and well being of our members and guests.

<u>Some Good News</u>. In August, the Society is once again going to host our in-person General Membership Programs. These are on the third Thursday of every month at 7:30pm at the Swezey-Avey House. Please check our *Newsletter* and our website for updates. All of our houses have been professionally cleaned for everyone's safety.

A brief update of some recent Historic District work follows:

<u>Hawkins House</u>--We have had our restoration carpenter (**Jerimiah McGiff**) continuing his work on the Hawkins House porch. He has been restoring the columns, balustrades, and the upper and lower rails. He has also replaced the steps that were compromised. We also had him repair the fencing that is on the north side of the property.

<u>Booth House</u> --We have replaced the locks at the Booth House and did some minor repairs at the house. We have repaired the fencing at the Buckingham Cemetery. We have also cleaned up the cemetery. We just need to paint the fence. We have repaired the herb garden fence that is behind the Booth House; this fence also needs to be painted.

<u>Homan-Gerard House</u>--We also have continued our work at the Homan House. We have continued to do the weather stripping and we had to take the rear door down and sand and refinish it. We also had an issue with one of the hearths that was not safe. We had to remove the bricks and the defining, replace both and shore up the underside of the hearth. We also checked the other hearths in the house and found them to be in good order.

<u>Hawkins Cemetery</u>--We are also restoring the cemetery sign. We will clean up the cemetery and put a split rail fence around it. We are evaluating getting a grant to restore the stones.

<u>Furniture Donations</u>--The Society recently received several large donations of furniture. We thank **Betty Fuka** and the **Edythe Davis Family** for their support. Among the two rooms full of furniture, there were pieces appropriate for each of our three historic houses (Booth, Hawkins, and Homan) plus a few pieces that remained to be used in the Swezey-Avey House.

Once again, I want to thank **Sherriff Toulon** and the inmate program. The program works so well and has been a big help to us in getting much of our work done.

As always, I also want to thank Eddie Morris for his generous support of our Society.

We are sad to announce the passing of Stanley Sulzynski this past spring. Stanley was a beloved and dedicated long-time member of the Yaphank Historical Society. Stanley joined the Society early on, working as part of the team that saved the Hawkins House from demolition. He loved his community and its history and wanted to help preserve this important historic house.

Stanley was interested in history and antiques throughout his life. He was a collector of beautiful pieces of furniture and interesting items from the past, and as a collector he always kept an eye open for something that would be appropriate for one of our historic houses. The

recent acquisition of a gentleman's shaving mirror from the Victorian era being a perfect example. Stanley donated that mirror to the Society and it now hangs in the master bedroom of the Hawkins House.

Stanley remained a life-long active member, dedicated to helping out at our semi-annual yard sales, Christmas house tours, and other fund-raising events. He almost always attended our General Meetings, bringing cookies or other goodies to share with attendees at the end of the program. One of his favorite events was our Victorian Tea. It was at that event that Stanley's personality really shone. Stanley, appropriately garbed in black tuxedo, gloves, and top hat, served as our esteemed butler. Our butler stood on the front porch of the Hawkins House welcoming our tea guests, helping them up the front steps, and then accompanying them to their tea table.

We have many, many fond memories of Stanley and we will all miss him.



House Museum Status for the Hawkins House

Plans to officially designate the Hawkins House as a House Museum are finally moving forward. Our Historic District Committee recently met several times, working with Richard Martin, Director of Historic Services, Suffolk County Parks Division. At the last meeting an interpretation date of 1884 was set for the museum. Also, it was recommended that the formal name of the house be changed to the Robert and Isabella Hawkins House. Both this name change and the interpretation date correctly recognizes the history of the house and Isabella's role in serving as owner and caretaker from 1856, following the death of her husband Robert, to 1884. The Yaphank Historical Society Board approved both the interpretation date and the renaming of the House. House museum work presently underway will focus on identifying existing current period-appropriate furnishings and noting which items that will need to be removed from the house.
