Many thanks go out to our 50th Anniversary committee members; they worked for months organizing and scheduling the many items, projects and work assignments necessary to meet our scheduled celebration date. Their work, and the work of Board Members and Society member volunteers, resulted in the great and happy celebration enjoyed by all on August 10, 2025. Special thanks go to committee chairperson Danielle Courtois and to our event coordinator Ellen Kushner. Without them we could never have put this together.

The Society received many well-deserved thanks and Proclamations from the attending dignitaries. County Executive Ed Romaine was also on hand for the unveiling of our 50th Anniversary Monument, marking the burial of a Society time capsule. Mr. Romaine expressed heartfelt interest in history and thanked the Society for its work in preserving the history of Yaphank.

Our Swezey-Avey House exhibit rooms, containing Society historical information and displays, were open for our visitors and Board Members were on hand to answer questions. Outside, our master gardeners were on hand to showcase ourButterfly Garden and our resident arborist MaryLaura Lamont was on hand to showcase the largest Sugar Maple Tree in Suffolk County. **THANK YOU ALL.**

As we look forward to our 51st year, we are awaiting our new contract from Suffolk County. The contract is a 20-yearcontract; it includes the Hawkins House and property, as well as the Homan and Booth Houses and the property behind both houses. The contract also includes provision for the Society to assume responsibility for the Prosser Pines Barn and surrounding property. The Society will be installing period-appropriate exhibits in the Barn and we hope to have the Barn open for our summer house tours.

Wealso plan to restore the shed structure that is located behind the Homan House. This is a shed that has been dated to 1800. Our good friend Stan Kazel of Dawn House Movers lifted the shed/barn up for us free of charge so that we can work on the stone foundation and restore the sills and the bottom part of the structure that is in bad shape. We can then lower the building down on the new stone foundation and restore the rest of the structure.

We are in the process of putting QR codes throughout our Historic District. Look for them; they will be on wooden posts, the top part of which will be painted yellow. The posts will be located at all of our historic houses, our gardens, our Nature Trail, and places of interest throughout the Yaphank Historic District. Just scan the code with your phone and get a description of the site you are at.

Several of us attended the Longwood Fair again this year. We had a great time, and we met so many people that we had not seen in years. We offered many Society handouts to the people who stopped by our table. We made new friends and signed up some new members.

Special thanks go to all our neighbors, supporters and volunteers, without whose help and generosity we could not have accomplished all that we have.

And I take this opportunity to sadly announce the passing of two good friends of the Society, Eric Crater and Kurt Kahofer—rest in peace.

Time Capsule Buried at Swezey-Avey House

Just prior to our 50th Anniversary Celebration, the Yaphank Historical Society buried a time capsule near the front gate of the Swezey-Avey House. Inside this container is a variety of items that shows the charming village of Yaphank as it is in 2024. A sampling of photographs of the village, newspapers, notes from people in the society, items of historic importance and more, were environmentally sealed and buried under concrete and stone. This time capsule is to be opened 25 years from now in 2049. We can only imagine what Yaphank will be like in 25 years.

Swezey-Avey House Presentation

On Thursday July 18th YHS President Bob Kessler gave a presentation on the history of the Swezey-Avey House. The house has a rich history and was home to early settlers of the area. The first saw mill in Yaphank was built next to the house, operated by Christopher Swezey. Many generations of Swezey's lived here afterwards. Sarah Swezey married Harry T. Avey, who she met in India and they both lived in the house for many years. The Town of Brookhaven purchased the house in 1963. In a joint effort with the Yaphank Historical Society the house was renovated and now houses the headquarters of the Yaphank Historical Society.



YHS Holds Fall Yard and Craft Sale

Long Island can have spectacular weather in September. When YHS held our annual fall Yard and Craft sale on September 14th at the Robert and Isabella Hawkins House, we had just that. Folks were out shopping, antiquing and looking for treasures in full force. There was plenty of fine merchandise available from our 27 vendors. Visitors also had the opportunity to visit the historic Shell Gas Station Museum, which was open to the public on the corner of Yaphank Avenue and Main Street right next door. It was a wonderful event in rural Yaphank.



Revolutionary Connection to Yaphank

Benjamin Tallmadge was a Setauket, Long Island-born Revolutionary hero. He was a child prodigy and attended Yale College at a young age. Upon graduating from Yale, he became a school teacher in Connecticut. When tensions reached a boiling point in Boston between the British homeland and the colonists, the battles of Lexington and Concord signaled the start of the Revolution. Sympathetic to the patriots, Tallmadge enlisted in the Continental Army. Rising up through the ranks, he eventually became the first director of intelligence for George Washington. Tallmadge led a daring raid on the British-controlled fort at the Manor of St. George in Mastic. In June, YHS Trustee Robert von Bernewitz gave a pictorial presentation on the path Tallmadge and his forces took during this raid, ,now known as the Tallmadge Trail.

It is with sadness that we note the passing of Eric Crater, a friend and Yaphank Historical Society preservation partner. As Assistant Director of Historic Services at the Suffolk County Parks Department, Eric worked closely with the Society to preserv e and restore historic buildings within the Yaphank Historic District, including the Robert & Isabella Hawkins House, the Booth House Museum, and most recently the Homan-Gerard House.

Many of us at the Society worked closely with Eric during these restoration projects and we remember his sense of humor, his knowledge, and his dedication to the work. We shared fun times along with the hard work that comes with any preservation project. We have a wealth of memories and Eric will be dearly missed. Each of our historic houses that are enjoyed by many visitors during our summer house tours are part of Eric's legacy and his commitment to preserving local history.
